Teaching Democratic Ideals

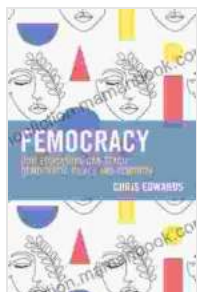
- **Inquiry-based learning:** Encourage students to critically examine historical events, current affairs, and social issues to develop their own understanding of democratic principles.

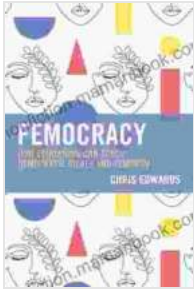

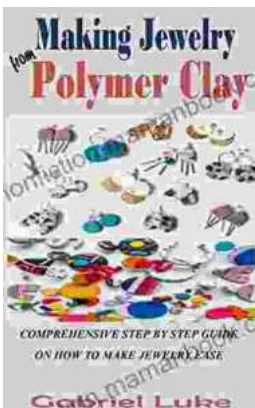
